On a document dated October 27, 2020, I provided notice that a tree on Caltrain's property, which is governed by nine (9) elected officers, damaged Benny Estrada's truck, and that the evidence substantiates the claim. The representative on this matter, Marshall Rush (and others), acted in bad faith when he neither acknowledged the evidence nor challenged it. Mr. Rush chose to be evasive in spite of the fact that the evidence delineated that the tree was on Caltrain's property. The damage is clear and elected officers are responsible to redress the debt and will be named in the filing to compensate the damage. With the failure of the representative to act in good faith, the issue is brought to the attention of elected officers.

Because I failed to use the correct nomenclature of the governing board, I shall provide a second 21 day notice for the officers of the Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board to compensate the damage caused by the tree on Caltrain's property. The alternative is to refute the established evidence that Caltrain is responsible for the damage caused to Benny Estada's truck, or accept the responsibility for damage caused by the tree on Caltrain's property. The notice takes effect on receipt.

Dear Caltrain Board,

The more beige poles that go up at University Ave station, the more unsightly it becomes. At ground level, you might think the beige color matches the station, but from the view of local buildings, you are completely destroying the view of our Santa Cruz Mountains, and local green vegetation on Stanford campus.

Can you please look into a way to fix this? Perhaps, painting any height above 10 feet, to be the standard forest green? Telecom poles can be camouflaged, the same applies here. Please look in to it, and let me know some options.

The selection of the beige color was done in coordination with the City of Palo Alto and is a common color for poles located near stations. Most poles are a neutral chrome color along the project area but in some cases, such as near stations, Caltrain staff worked with local cities to identify pole colors that aligned with certain station areas. Once the poles have been procured and placed, we are not able to change the colors of those poles. Thank you again for reaching out to us.
