

TRANSIT DISTRICT 2020 Survey Results


- Density: Support for additional growth in the Transit District, close to the Transit Center.
- Height: Allowing taller buildings to provide more housing or open space, but maintaining DTPP heights for office.
- Transit: Grade separations would support increased transit.

- Affordable Housing: Preference for larger, family-friendly housing even if it means fewer overall units.
- Circulation: Desire for comfortable and safe walking and biking paths within, and connecting to, the Transit District.

TRANSIT DISTRICT 2021 Survey Results

- Open Space: Nature and landscaped open spaces are highly desired and will enhance the Transit Center experience.
- Pedestrian and Bicycle: Pedestrian & bike infrastructure improvements are a high priority along Broadway, El Camino Real, and James Avenue.
- Redwood City Identity: Transit Center's identity should be forward-looking and sustainable, while also celebrating the culture of the historic downtown.
- Amenities: Vibrant and walkable destinations such as restaurants, shops, public art, and open-air markets are highly desired to activate street life.






Proposed Location


FIGURE 3: EXISTING AND PROPOSED TRANSIT CENTER


